MANAGER'S REPORT

1. COVID-19

City Manager Cotter said there was a substantial decline in cases from a few months ago. He said vaccinations were available for anyone interested through the Mohave County Health website.

2. Pest Abatement Updates

Pest Abatement Manager Dr. Michael Cavallaro talked about the pest abatement program. He said they would distribute caddisfly surveys to riverfront residents in collaboration with the University of Arizona Entomology Department. He said the program stocked 60,000 rainbow trout each year. He said they would install artificial fish habitats into the river at six different sites where they found the caddisfly population to be at its highest density in order to protect the trout.

3. Annual Report - Boys and Girls Club

Autumn Boyle-Robinson said this past year, their five facilities went from being an after school program to an all-day program to provide a safe site for long distance learning, daily physical activity, and meals. She said they helped 1,000 children and it was an amazing year. She said they were grateful for the city's support as well as the entire community.

4. Sports Tourism Update

City Manager Cotter said sports tournaments had continued in the community throughout the pandemic with COVID restrictions in place. He said the economic impact from those tournaments was in the millions of dollars. He said sports tourism activities would continue through the summer.

5. Rights of Way Landscaping

City Manager Cotter said the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) had performed construction work on the center lane medians on Highway 95 from the Laughlin Bridge south to the Post Office and the Parkway to Aztec in Fort Mohave. He said the city had placed some small metal work and rocks that were approved by ADOT in those medians. He said the city-owned medians along the Parkway to the Field House had beautiful flagstone and tall artwork.

City Manager Cotter said Recyclops offered a curb-side subscription recycling service for consumers at large and approached the city earlier this year about initiating the pay-for-service for consumers desiring to continue with recycling activities.

Derek from Recyclops provided a brief overview of their program and operation.

City Manager Cotter said the city had no part in the program, and said Recyclops had agreed to a license agreement that outlined its proposed activities and made certain affirmations in relation to its conduct of business.

Vice Mayor D'Amico asked about the insurance requirements for the business and its contractors.

Derek said they had corporate insurance plus each driver was required to provide their own insurance.

Council Member Brummett asked if special bags or receptacles would be provided.

Derek said they would provide 13-gallon clear trash bags under the program and carts for a refundable deposit.

Council Member Zehri asked about the number of recycling customers in the city. He asked if education about recycling would be provided by Recyclops.

He said the merger was a benefit to everyone, especially those living in the north side of the city, because they would not have to pay the taxing district any more.

Council Member Clark said the process of disbanding the district began many years ago and they were finally getting there. He said the district was created before the city incorporated. He said the city had been administratively operating certain pieces of the district for a long time. Mayor Brady asked if anyone from the public wanted to speak.

Billy Pershing asked if the residents would see a tax reduction.

City Manager Cotter said that water district tax would go away.

Operations Manager Ryan Farnell said a minimum of ten years.

Gary Genovese asked if the street sweeper would be used to pick up extra water on the streets after a rainstorm.

Operations Manager Farnell confirmed.

Dan Lorence asked if the city looked at additional options for purchase.

Public Works Director Johnson said they purchased the equipment through Sourcewell in order to get the best price possible.

He said the city's parks and neighborhoods had seen an increase in people feeding pigeons. He said Clark County, Henderson, and Las Vegas also banned the feeding of pigeons within their communities. He displayed some news videos from Clark County relating to the pigeon feeding ban.

He said as part of the process, it was determined that certain changes would need to be made in the existing medical marijuana code provisions to provide for consistence, compared to the recreational provisions, in the treatment of qualified zoning for areas of operation and odor control.

City Attorney Emery said the acts passed by the voters allowed limited cultivation in an enclosed residential area. He said there was no odor control for residential grows, which was limited to six plants and twelve plants if growing for another individual.
